> Jesus gave us the example of a life of prayer:

Matthew 14:23 (NKJV)

And when He had sent the multitudes away, He went up on the mountain by Himself to pray. Now when evening came, He was alone there.

Mark 1:35 (NKJV)

Now in the morning, having risen a long while before daylight, He went out and departed to a solitary place; and there He prayed.

Luke 5:16 (NKJV)

So He Himself often withdrew into the wilderness and prayed.

Luke 6:12 (NKJV)

Now it came to pass in those days that He went out to the mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God.

6 But you, when you pray, go into your room...

7 And when you pray, do not use vain repetitions as the heathen do."

Pray without ceasing

>	Three Purposes of Prayer: "Why should we pray?"	
	1 When there is a need; when you want God to do something for you; when you need God to provide, to change circumstances, and to act.	
	2 When there is a question; when you want God to give clear direction; when you want God to make His will known; when you want God to speak.	
	3 This is you loving God in response to His great love for you.

	29 Jesus answered him, "The <u>first</u> of all the commandments is: Hear, O Israel, the LORD or God, the LORD is one. 30 And you shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with a your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' This is the <u>first</u> commandment.

-	While Abraham interceded for Lot and Sodom, he still took time to commune with God (see Genesis 18:16-33).
_	While Moses interceded for the people, he still prayed for a personal revelation of God's glory (see Exodus 33:12-23).
